## Lessons Learnt

Key themes identified during change process:

- Communication, or lack thereof
  - Comfort with status quo - "it's good enough"
  - Feedback statements received - varied understanding and acceptance of different care models available
  - Resistance to change
  - Challenges of consultation across multiple campuses, rural towns and different audiences
  - Engagement - the power of consumers
