Queensland Dementia, Ageing and Frailty (QDAF) Clinical Network Work Plan 2024-25

Objectives

The Work Plan 2024-25 captures planned activities of the Queensland Dementia, Ageing, and Frailty Clinical Network (QDAF) that are in alignment with Queensland Health system-wide strategic priorities, across the next 12 months. The key function of the QDAF is to drive improvements in the quality, safety, and effectiveness of services for older adults in Queensland.

We will achieve these activities through:

- Supporting the development and critical review of evidence-based standards of care, clinical policy, guidelines and pathways, and endorsing those that support the changing needs of the population and foster safe and effective innovation across health services relating to dementia, ageing, and frailty.
- Actioning network-wide communications, discussion forums and focussed working groups to enable:
 - sharing of innovative approaches to older adult care statewide, nationally and internationally,
 - consultation across topical issues or concerns related to dementia, ageing, and frailty services in Queensland,
 - awareness of successful trial models of care for older adults that have potential to scale to statewide implementation.
- **Provision of an open and supportive environment** to hear from consumers of dementia, ageing and frailty services to better understand the patient journey, needs and insights and to support co-design and consumer-inclusive initiatives.
- Supporting equity of access to dementia, ageing, and frailty health services for vulnerable populations including First Nations, those culturally and linguistically diverse, those living in rural and remote areas, and those from lower socio-economic areas through advocacy and collaborative engagement with Hospital and Health Services, primary care, community stakeholders, non-government organisations, and the Queensland Department of Health.
- Fostering education and training to support provision of best practice care for older Queenslanders.
- **Facilitating engagement and collaboration** between Queensland Health, community and primary health care providers as well as local, interstate and national partners in older adult care to explore evidence-based multidisciplinary ideas, advice and models of care that may positively influence service delivery and patient outcomes for older adults in Queensland.
- **Provision of expertise, direction and advice** to Queensland Health Executive, Hospital and Health Services, and Boards of Management in relation to service planning and emerging issues in the dementia, ageing, and frailty care space locally, statewide and nationally. This will be leveraged by working with other Clinical Networks (within Queensland and interstate).





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Our aim: We will support ongoing development of capability and capacity in service delivery, leveraging an open and progressive community of shared expertise comprised of clinicians, stakeholders, consumers and broader collaborators. We will identify and support solutions, models and initiatives that deliver equitable, high-quality older adult services and improved patient outcomes. We will evaluate and communicate our impact using logic models, the Improvement Exchange, Network Forums, communiques, and links to the Queensland Department of Health.
